Palms and Thorns

Dr. Fred Craddock, a well-known biblical scholar from Emory University, once told of a time he received a letter from Washington D.C. to speak at a prayer breakfast in Seoul, South Korea. He was the guest of General Stillwell, head of the Eighth Army and over 50,000 soldiers stationed there.

The morning he was in Seoul, he worshiped with those in the military. As the service came to an end, the General asked Dr. Craddock to pray for them, but there was a catch. The General said, "Please don't pray for power, we have the power. We can bring destruction. What we need you to pray for is restraint." The mark of a civilized society is not power, but restraint. The same is true is of a society embracing the Christian faith. The mark is power, restrained by love.

We all have some power and we can choose how to use the gifts we are blessed with. Hopefully, as Dr. Craddock learned, we will focus on power, restrained by love. The ultimate example of this comes to us from Jesus Christ during Holy Week.

As Jesus comes into Jerusalem on the very first Palm Sunday, he is the mighty King, the powerful Son of God. He is the most powerful person in the world. Yet, according to Luke 19:28-36, he comes into town riding on a colt. He comes into the city in a most humble way. This humility would continue throughout the final week of his life. He would wash the feet of the disciples on Holy Thursday in the Upper Room. He would allow himself to be arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane. He doesn't hold back as the Jewish authorities bring him to Pontius Pilate.

Looking at the cross, he has power that might enable him get away. He is God in human form. He could make the huge leap. Even those closest to him expect him to release himself. Some of the individuals at the base of the cross say, "If you are the king, then make the leap. Show us who you are!" People wonder what our Lord is going to do. And then he does it. He dies. He is different than any other king who lived. He shows us power, restrained by love in a most surprising way.

Lent and Holy Week are times to ponder big questions. As we reflect on Jesus coming into town on a colt and finishing his week on a cross, let us think about how he chose to exercise his power. Might our Lord's actions influence the decisions we make in the ways we live and love!

PALM SUNDAY: "Hosanna in the Highest"

Grace to you and peace on this Palm Sunday. Lament is a common word that we are using in these days to describe our coronavirus world. Lament in the Bible has always been a deep expression of grief and sorrow for someone who has died or for something that is gone. In the midst of the deadly effects of the virus and our attempts to stop its spread, we lament all that we have lost in our global family and cry out to God for help. At the same time, it is important that we have the freedom in worship to name and lament our distress over such things.

As we enter Holy Week, one of the most poignant times of lamentation took place when Jesus was led away to the cross. Luke writes, "As they led Jesus away, they grabbed Simon, a man from Cyrene, who was coming in from the countryside. They put the cross on his back and made him carry it behind Jesus. A huge crowd of people followed Jesus, including women, who were mourning and wailing for him. Jesus turned to the women and said, 'Daughters of Jerusalem, don't cry for me. Rather, cry for yourselves and your children.'"

In the midst of our lamentation for our world and its people, we claim the promises of God in the third chapter of the Old Testament book of Lamentations (22-23), "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness."

Our beloved hymn, "Great is Thy Faithfulness" was written by Thomas Chisholm, who was ordained as a Methodist minister in 1903 but served only one appointment. Out of the 1,200 poems that Chisholm wrote during this lifetime, this is the hymn that has been a favorite of United Methodists for decades. In fact, I sang it last Sunday as I was livestreaming a worship service at home.

As we enter Holy Week in the year 2020, you and I travel together with Jesus from the anointing at Bethany to Jerusalem, to the temple, to the Mount of Olives, to the Upper Room, to the Garden of Gethsemane, to the high priest's house, to Pilate, to Herod, to Golgotha, to the cross, to the tomb, and to the resurrection. At the same time as we will not be physically together as the body of Christ, may we remember and claim the good news of the gospel, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen!" He has risen indeed! Thanks be to God!

Great is Thy faithfulness; O God my Father There is no shadow of turning with Thee Thou changest not, Thy compassions they fail not As Thou hast been, Thou forever will be Great is Thy faithfulness; Great is Thy faithfulness Morning by morning new mercies I see And all I have needed Thy hand hath provided Great is Thy faithfulness; Lord unto me. Amen.
