On the Journey

Sir Winston Churchill took three years to get through the eighth grade because he had trouble learning English. Life was not always easy for this leader. How fascinating that many years later Oxford University invited him to give the commencement address at their graduation ceremony.

As Churchill spoke to students on this important day, with power and authority, he shouted three words. He said, "Never give up!" Several seconds passed before Churchill rose to his toes and said it again, "Never give up!" There was now a silence as Churchill reached his cane and top hat and walked off the stage. All he said were the words, "Never give up!" A short and eloquent commencement address if ever there was one.

This story brings out the importance of perseverance. The Greek word translated "perseverance" essentially means "to abide." It is sometimes seen in the New Testament as "patience."

Perseverance is seen in the wonderful account in Mark 2:1-12 in which four friends help a man who has been paralyzed for a long time. The friends take the man to a house where Jesus is speaking. They find the dwelling surrounded by a crowd of people. They need to do something. So they climb the outside stairs and dig through the sticks and mud on top of the house. They lower their friend to the feet of Jesus. Jesus says, "Son, your sins are forgiven." Our Lord then tells him to get up and walk. And he does!

This tremendous narrative brings out the power of perseverance. The four friends refuse to give up. This biblical story makes us look at our life. Where do we need to persevere?

Personally, you might be working through a health challenge, family matter, or financial obstacle. Collectively, we continue to work through this pandemic time and we struggle to address racism. We also seek equality for members of the LGBTQ community and we work to bring hope to our refugee and immigrant sisters and brothers. And this is only the beginning of matters that need attention.

Life is never easy, but the call is to keep moving forward. Surrounded by good friends and the presence of our mighty God, might we keep working to make a difference! Blessings to you! Scott

A Summer of Challenges

Everyone is dealing with way too many challenges this summer. With the COVID-19 virus, much-needed church renovations, and social distancing, there is a lot—and CWM is feeling it.

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Child care is a particular need in Iowa, and we at Lovely Lane are trying to help. Even without the pandemic, Iowa has been identified as a child care desert. Iowa had an estimated shortfall of 350,000 child care slots *before* the pandemic. As many as 30% of child care slots have been lost since March.

Lovely Lane's long history of offering quality care to the children of our community is a bright spot in this situation; but, it has called for persistence, patience, help from the CARES Act, and lots of commitment by our congregation. We ask for everyone's continued support in the coming months as we continue to seek ways to serve our community families, and thank you in advance for your prayers and support.

A Conversation on Race - Iowa Conference, The United Methodist Church

Almost 190 people listened live on Facebook as Bishop Laurie hosted a Conversation on Race with members of our Iowa UM Conference family. This conversation is the 1st in a series intended to help all of us to see, listen and learn from our black brothers and sisters in Christ.

Rev. LaTonya Calderon, Rev. Abraham Funchess, Grace Kiboko, Rev. Dr. Michel Lundula, and Rev. Dr. Jacqueline Thompson shared their personal experiences with being black in America and the Iowa Annual Conference.

"John Wesley said, 'the world is my parish,' but for black folks, we're not wanted everywhere," said Rev. LaTonya Calderon.

Her thoughts were echoed by other panelists, and Rev. Dr. Jacqueline Thompson described some of the things that have been said to her in previous parishes.

"I have had congregants say, 'You're our pastor? The bishop must be mad at us' and 'You're our pastor? It's because we don't pay our apportionments," Thompson said. "If I had to choose one word to describe what it's like, I'd say exhausting."

This opportunity for listening comes after the recent killings of Ahmaud Arbery, George Floyd and Breonna Taylor and stirred protests against police brutality across the country and world.

"I'm so profoundly aware that what is happening now is nothing new...it's so evident for us right now, because it's a reflection of what has happened in the past," Calderon said. "It's exhausting for me that white people continue to ignore, deny, hide or simply refuse to change or be part of the change."

"Borrowing a phrase from the Des Moines Black Lives Matter leader, 'While I like the word listen, I much prefer the word action,'" added Thompson.

Rev. Abraham Funchess is hopeful that through the current conversation in our nation, the creation of multiracial coalitions can begin to make change.

"It's an opportunity for all of us to come together across a lot of barriers to attack racism and other systemic ills that hurt this country and I believe that's what Christ would want us to do," he said. "You may be upset about the police terrorism but also let's talk about poverty, education and other things hurting not only blacks but other ethnicities and indigenous people."

Grace Kiboko added that these conversations are not always going to be comfortable, but we need to face that in order to move forward as a country and conference.

"You hear the phrase 'lowa Nice," she said. "We're nice to everyone, but we avoid uncomfortable conversations and difficult topics like racism. There's going to be times when you are uncomfortable, that you're going to want to retreat, but don't back away from that feeling.

Complacency is what got us this far. It's why the protests have been going on for nineteen days. Real change happens when you look inside your heart and ask, 'What are the things I'm doing to make real change in my community?'"

Rev. Dr. Michel Lundula knows in his heart that the church is the best way to create that change.

"I'm hopeful that this is the beginning of many conversations that lead us into better conversations in our congregations," he said. "The church must be a voice, and it is our responsibility to take this lesson for people to hear."

The panelists were also asked what the conference could do to better to support them moving forward—ideas included:

- Mandatory cross-cultural training for each church, regardless of who its pastor will be.
- Mandatory implicit bias training for each clergy person and conference employee.
- Holding a conference to address minority communities in the Iowa Conference.
- Encouraging multiethnic conversations all the time, not just when there is a problem.

• Making the work of the General Commission on Religion and Race and the Iowa Commission on Religion and Race more visible.

- Inviting black voices to be heard all the time, not only when the conversation is about race.
- Creating an intentionality for all congregations in the Iowa Conference to receive persons of color.

"Make this not just a moment in time," said Kiboko. "Make this not like Ferguson in 2014 and let it fade away. We have an opportunity to make real change."


