Making Decisions

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart" – Proverbs 3:5 (CEB)

Eleanor Roosevelt once remarked that "one's philosophy is expressed in the choices one makes. In the long run, we shape our lives and we shape ourselves . . . and the choices we make are ultimately our responsibility."

We make choices, or decisions, all the time. Life involves commitments. Some of these are made on a daily basis. We decide what to wear, what to eat, and how we spend our free time. Other decisions are larger in scope. At times we might ponder a new career path or how to respond to the actions of a family member. We tend to put more thought and consideration into these larger choices.

Theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote in his book, *Ethics*, that decisionmaking comes down to the will of God in the moment and the needs of our neighbor. I think that's a pretty good approach to take. Looking at the will of God, we focus on the actions of Jesus. Jesus provides a picture of God. Jesus was always looking beyond himself and he had a heart for those who were often overlooked in society. In Mark 1:40-45 Jesus heals, and touches, the person with leprosy who comes to him. In John 4, Jesus reaches out to the Samaritan Woman at the Well and speaks about the importance of living water.

This month Pastor Kristina and I will focus on the decision-making process in our worship services. We will put forth a preaching series entitled, "Making Decisions." On October 4, Kristina will talk about the decision to care for the natural world and the animal world. A blessing of pets will take place after worship in our church parking lot.

On October 11, I will lift up the choice we make to forgive another person. This decision can be challenging, but there is much to consider as we reflect on scripture. Our emphasis on October 18 will be the decision to financially give to the church. This will be our Stewardship Sunday. The aim is always the tithe or to make strides in that direction.

Finally, on October 25, Kristina and I will preach a tag-team sermon about the decision to cast a vote. With a general election coming up, as well as state and local decisions, the need is present to make our vote count.

From Our New Associate Pastor, Rev. Kristina Roth-Klinck

My position here at Lovely Lane is split halftime with Matthew 25, where I serve as a spiritual cultivator, planting a diverse progressive community of faith. Matthew 25 is a non-profit organization on the west side of the Cedar River that does work primarily in the Taylor and Northwest neighborhoods. We see the potential in the neighborhood and the gifts, skills, and talents of each person who lives there. Matthew 25 does work in the areas of food, education, and housing, what we see as building blocks for a healthy neighborhood. Part of that work in housing includes a week called "Transform Week" which happens every summer.

This year because of the Pandemic, Transform Week was postponed to August with an additional week of October 13-17. Transform Week is a week of completing projects on homes and neighborhood buildings to help make these areas healthier, safer, and more attractive. You don't have to have many skills to help with Transform Week. While we do appreciate volunteers with knowledge of power tools and general construction, we welcome gardening, painting, hauling out debris, etc. There is usually some task that you can handle. Whether you can only assist for part of a day or the entire week, we'll work you in!

Panel Discussion: The theological roots of racism & colonialism

(part of the UMC's *Dismantling Racism* Series)

Jesus calls his followers to love their neighbor. So why have Christians found ways to refuse their neighbors not just love but basic dignity?

"We know better," said the Rev. Mai-Anh Le Tran of United Methodist Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois. "Why don't we act or live differently? It strikes me as that we are still befuddled by our human fallibility."

For an hour, she and two other theologians wrestled with why racism remains prevalent in the U.S., where Christianity is the dominant faith. They spoke as part of The United Methodist Church's fourth online panel held to discuss eradicating racial injustice.

The 9/16 panel discussion came a day after Barna released new research showing an increasing percentage of practicing Christians say they are "unmotivated" or "not at all motivated" to address racial injustice. Barna found that percentage grew from 17% in 2019 to 30% this year, even after the deaths of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery and Breonna Taylor and the shooting of Jacob Blake drew international attention, and news spread that COVID-19 is disproportionately killing ethnic minorities, including children. The survey also found that nearly 1 in 5 practicing Christians say that race is "not at all" a problem in the U.S. Erin Hawkins, the panel's moderator, pointed to research by PRRI (Public Religion Research Institute) that specifically focused on white Christians in the U.S.

"White Christians are consistently more likely than whites who are religiously unaffiliated to deny the existence of structural racism," wrote Robert P. Jones, PRRI's founder, for NBC News.

Such data didn't surprise the theologians on the panel.

"There is an assumption that somehow racism as systems of behavior, beliefs, values, actions, practices or policies are done by so-called bad people...that we are somehow immune to that," said Tran, author of "Reset the Heart: Unlearning Violence, Relearning Hope" (Abingdon Press, 2017).

However, she said, that fails to take into account how race still organizes American thinking whether people realize it or not.

"Racism as a system is not something we are purposefully doing against somebody," said the ordained elder and professor. "It's our assumption that this is how the world is."

The Rev. Edgardo Colón-Emeric, who serves on The United Methodist Church's Faith and Order Committee, said the disconnect "is an example of how the power of sin continues to be at work."

But he added that it is the legacy of the church's history and the fact that many Americans don't know the basics of their own history.

Colón-Emeric pointed to the background he chose for the video conference—a picture of the island of Vieques, which is part of the U.S. today because of conquest during the 1898 Spanish-American War. "Nobody migrated anywhere. It was conquered as part of war," said Colón-Emeric, whose mother hails from the Puerto Rican island. "I'm glad the Methodist Church is on the island, but there is also the history of how it came to be on the island."

For many, it's hard to separate the act of spreading the Gospel from the act of conquering a people. However, the theologians urged listeners to look differently at the Christian commission, which is also The United Methodist Church's mission statement "to make disciples of Jesus Christ."

The Rev. Willie James Jennings, professor at Yale Divinity School and ordained Baptist minister, acknowledged that many white people feel like they are under attack in this moment when there is so much discussion of racism and colonialism.

However, he added that the effort to dismantle racism is not about diminishing white people so much as reminding them that they aren't the center of the universe.

"So many people, especially Christians, have formed a world in which everything revolves around them," said Jennings, who recently published "After Whiteness: An Education in Belonging."

"So many Christians struggle mightily with this moment, struggle mightily with thinking about racial problems in the world and thinking seriously about the diversity that is God's creation. The reason is they have to wrestle with a reality in which they aren't at the center."

He said Christians have also gotten into the habit of reading the Bible as if it's first—their book and their story. The theologians suggested one way to address racism is for Christians to look at Scripture with fresh eyes, reach out to others and look beyond the anxieties of these times.

"You are inside God's story, and it's important to center yourself in that story," Jennings said. "You calibrate what you are doing by that story and no other."

ROTARY INVOCATION-September 21, 2020 (by Pastor Scott)

As we all know, **2020** is a year we will never forget. With the pandemic, derecho, conversations about race and class, as well as a Presidential election, there is so much going on. And with the news of Ruth Bader Ginsburg's recent passing, we take time to celebrate her life, but we also ponder the political implications. It is easy to experience stress in all this. Some stress, of course, can be good. We all need it to work. Stress can keep our antenna strong and increase our wisdom. The concern is the amount of stress. Increased stress causes worry and this leads to anxiety.

We tend to dislike and avoid anxiety. Some of us get overinvolved in current events as a way of coping. Others of us ignore what's going on and pretend that nothing is happening. We avoid talking about the matter and tune it out. In all this, we need to remember it is within our power to be our own self during a time of anxiety. As long as we're breathing, we are alive.
